Planning to vote by mail? A USPS postmark change means ballots mailed close to Election Day could be postmarked late and not counted. Return your ballot as early as possible or use an official Cook County Clerk's Office drop box. Go to www.cookcountyclerk.com/MBdropbox

Voters planning to vote by mail should be aware of a recent USPS postmark policy change that could affect the timely counting of ballots. Because postmarks now reflect when mail is processed — not when it is dropped off — ballots mailed close to Election Day could be postmarked late and rejected. Cook County Clerk Monica Gordon is encouraging suburban voters to return mail ballots early, request a postmark at a post office, or use an official ballot drop box beginning March 2. www.cookcountyclerk.com/MBdropbox
